LAKE STATUS SUMMARY

One of the responsibilities of the Illinois Department of Natural Resources is to provide outdoor recreation opportunities to the residents of Illinois. One means of increasing this opportunity has been through the leasing of valuable recreation land and water from utility companies. The Clinton Lake State Recreation Area is operated by the Illinois Department of Natural Resources with the cooperation of Exelon Corporation. This site has greatly increased the fishing opportunity, as well as other major water recreational activities, for residents of Illinois.

LOCATION: Clinton Lake is located in DeWitt County 10 miles east of Clinton, IL.

DESCRIPTION: This 4,895 acre lake was constructed to serve as a cooling reservoir for the Clinton Nuclear Power Station. The lake has a maximum depth of 60 feet and an average depth of 15 feet. Clinton Lake is No Wake for all boats from 1/2 hour after sunset to 1/2 hour before sunrise with the exception of waterfowl hunters. Various portions of the lake are designated as no-wake, electric motor only, or no boat areas for safety and security reasons. All IDNR ramps are now equipped with wheelchair accessible boat docks. There are 17 Class AA campsites, 286 Class A campsites and 5 Class B/S campsites at Clinton Lake with showers and almost all are adaptable to either tents, trailers or motor homes. STATUS OF THE SPORT FISHERY: The IDNR Division of Fisheries has been active in the management of the fisheries in Clinton Lake since the lake opened in 1979. The lake receives stockings of walleye, hybrid striped bass, blue catfish, and blacknose crappie. The following information is a summary of the major sport fisheries based on periodic fish population surveys.

Largemouth Bass/Smallmouth Bass - The most recent survey resulted in a catch rate of 92.6 bass per hour. The average catch rate for the past 4 surveys is 87.7 bass per hour. The largest bass collected weighed 5.7 pounds. There are good numbers of larger bass in the lake, with 51% being over 12 inches in length and 33% over 15 inches. Clinton Lake has an excellent bass population.

In order to improve the smallmouth bass fishery, the State Hatchery System stocked smallmouth bass in Clinton Lake from 2001 to 2012. The highest catch rate for smallmouth bass was obtained in the 2009 survey and numbers are declining since the stocking program was terminated.

Walleye – The catch rate for walleye during the most recent survey was 2.98 walleye per hour. The 4-survey average is 6.2 walleye per hour. The heaviest walleye collected weighed 5.63 pounds. Clinton Lake has a good walleye fishery.

Hybrid Striped Bass - Hybrid striped bass were first stocked in Clinton Lake in 1978. During the spring netting survey, hybrid striped bass were collected at a rate of 26.6 per net. The 4-survey average is 22.6 hybrids per net. The hybrid striped bass ranged in size from 15 inches to 26 inches. The heaviest hybrid weighed 11.68 pounds and the average weight was 3.94 pounds. Clinton Lake has an excellent hybrid striped bass fishery.

White Bass – There were strong year classes in 2011 and 2014 which has produced a great white bass fishery. The catch rate in the most recent survey was 44 white bass per hour. The 4-survey average is 21.5 white bass per hour. The largest white bass collected weighed 1.6 pounds and the average weight was 0.5 pounds.

Crappie – In an attempt to improve the crappie fishery, blacknose crappie are stocked from on-site rearing ponds. During the most recent survey, the catch rate for black crappie was 13.6 black crappie per hour and the catch rate for white crappie was 61.4 per hour. There was a large increase in the number of white crappie in the recent survey. The blacknose crappie catch rate was 6.4 per hour. Clinton Lake is producing a tremendous crappie fishery.
